Classes are available to help students in their quest to become certified as 21st Century Watchmakers (CW21) or 21st Century Clockmakers (CC21).

Another Central Texas organization which plays an important role in horological pursuits is the **Capitol Area Watchmakers-Clockmakers Guild**. It has been recognized nationally for its excellence in educational programs and service to its members. The officers and directors work diligently to promote social and educational activities.

The **Southwest Museum of Clocks and Watches** promotes all horological organizations through its efforts to recruit members for the various groups. The Museum presents programs for the public at large which will inspire them toward learning more about timepieces and getting involved in clock and watch activities.

Without the dedicated leaders and volunteers of the above organizations, none of these opportunities would exist. The continued support and involvement of the membership will assure the future of horology. We must work to preserve our rich heritage for generations to come. Let us not waste time in these timely pursuits. Time waits for no one.

Great Southwestern Chapter 15 Regional Results

Our move to New Braunfels in 2008 proved to be a success, both financially and participation-wise. The number of registered attendees (201) was significantly up and Saturday participation in particular was more robust than 2007. The number of tables rented was down very slightly, but only by five tables--the number normally rented by one of our former chapter presidents, who was busy planning the NAWCC National Convention and couldn't make it this year. Both figures can probably be improved upon with better and earlier advertising and promotion, along with incorporating the wants and desires of members about how to run the regional (feedback has been very limited).

My major focus of the 2008 regional was to cut costs while improving attendance and participation. At our prior location, numerous charges for incidental items caused us to lose \$1160.99 (\$545.40 of this amount was for coffee!!!). I'm pleased to report that subject to one or two small and late arriving bills, the 2008 Great Southwestern Regional is the black this year by \$942.10--an improvement of \$2103.09. Total income was nearly the same at a little more than \$7400, but 2007 income included \$1455 from the raffle of a clock donated by Gene.

Major cost reductions came from reduced rent for the exhibit hall and meeting room(s), security, insurance, coffee, and program design and printing. The City of New Braunfels simply gave us a much better deal than anybody else around (San Marcos Convention Center offered us a "discount" price of \$2500 per day for next year). Security and insurance costs were reduced by setting up the exhibit and mart later (Friday morning), which is part of the reason for the later than normal start to the mart. An early start requires setting up the exhibit the night before, which requires all night security at \$20 an hour.

A clarified interpretation from NAWCC of the exhibit location requirement allowed us to bring the exhibit into the same room as the mart this year, reducing our need for security as well.

The slight increase for "food" is a little misleading, because this year, the large exhibit hall allowed us to bring the hospitality tables into the mart room. More snack food was provided to feed more attendees at a more convenient location, but 75% of the cost was covered by donations that are reflected in "Fees and Donations". The NAWCC expense of \$295.00 was also included in Fees and Donations, as this was for memberships and fees for non-member mart registrations (to be applied toward NAWCC membership). Bank Fees were quietly imposed by our bank and had accumulated during the year until our account type was changed in March.

The balance in the regional account, after 2008 expenses noted below, was \$4175.85. Based on our experience and cost estimates for 2009, a \$1060 deposit was paid to the City of New Braunfels to cover 50% of the cost of renting the exhibit hall again for next year, leaving a balance of \$3115.85. Again, one or two minor expenses have yet to clear, but this cost will not affect the bottom line by very much.
