Regional Update

More than 200 people attended last year's regional, and it took the efforts of 14 volunteers to pull it off.

Two years ago, Gene donated a very nice triple-decker clock that raised nearly \$1200 in the raffle. Without that donation, the regional expenses would not be at break-even for the past two years (combined).

I'm looking forward to hearing from many of you soon, but I will continue to talk to some members to recruit them to regional positions and to run for chapter officer positions over the next couple of months.

WHAT A HOMECOMING!

In December 2001 my wife Sue and I took a wonderful trip to Australia. While we were in Melbourne, we visited a few clock shops, as I wanted a clock with "Melbourne" on the dial. To my surprise, I found a clock whose dial bore this wording:

**J. Allen
Melbourne**

On further inspection, I discovered that the clock is an Ansonia. I bought that clock, and the shop owner shipped it home to me in Corpus Christi, Texas.

After receiving the clock, I had the case worked on and the dial touched up, and I reworked the movement. The movement was strange in that the time train needed much work, but the strike train was perfect. After the dial was back in my hands, I found out why the time train needed so much work. Apparently Mr. J. Allen wanted "time" in his Melbourne office but not "chime." I know this because of the wear and the small "T" next to the "time" winding hole arbor. Mr. Allen never used the chime.

This clock was made in Brooklyn, New York, so it was made between 1878 and 1920. Sometime after it was made, it was apparently moved to the West Coast and then went to Melbourne. Mr. J. Allen in Melbourne put his name and the city name on the dial. The clock clearly stayed in Melbourne until I bought it and returned it to the U.S.A. I have been unable to locate any J. Allen in Melbourne.

The clock is now "home" in my home, and I love to tell people who visit here about the travels of this wonderful Ansonia. They always say, "What a Homecoming!"

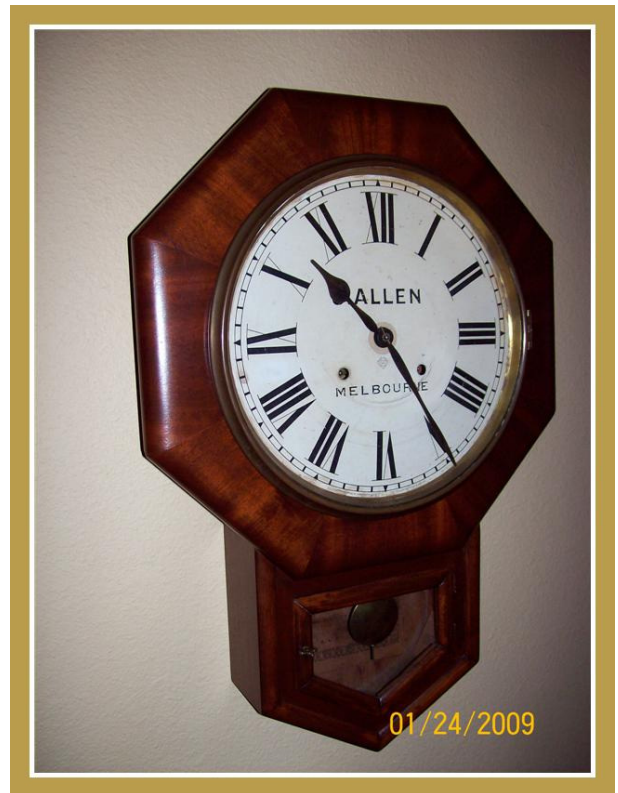

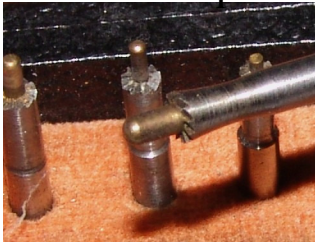
The clock was manufactured between 1878 (company moved to Brooklyn) and 1929 (company sold to Russians).

#1 Close Up



Sort of an endmill. The center piece is a pilot to go in a hole Then the "teeth" will cut the area around the hole. Frequently used to cut down bushes that are too tall, or used as a countersink. This an old set.



#2 Roller Remover but can be used to gently push on any friction fit piece. The jaw on each side adjusts and center piece is driven by knob at top.

Burnisher for work hardening metal.
