Thanks much to Pat and Jay for ironing out the details surrounding procuring this new facility...it's not easy. We'll make good use of it this month with a round-robin on clock restoration and repair techniques. Many have been asking for more hands-on restoration techniques and methods demonstrations. Well, here they come!

June Program – "The first one..."

On Saturday, June 25th, we learned that "The first one..." for Chapter 15 members ranged from clocks named George and Pierre to watches that had belonged to grandparents and great-grandparents to fantastic antiques and mart finds. Although several regular attendees were out of town, everyone who was able to attend had a great time seeing these first timepieces and hearing the wonderful stories of how they were obtained.

Tom Tarpy, George's new family, shared some of the extensive research he has conducted trying to learn more about George's roots – a search that included sources ranging from northern England to our own NAWCC library. Carolyn Spillers related how she persevered until the very end of an auction, when everyone else had depleted their budgets, to obtain Pierre for \$17. A wonderful French marble clock, his only fault was a missing pendulum – a lack that was quickly remedied by their friend Cecil Mulholland. Not bad for her first clock purchase!



Carolyn, Jay Holloway and Rusty Horn all shared wonderful watches, memories and stories of their relatives who had owned the timepieces. Karen Rasmussen told about her first military watch, obtained when Dan Havlik alerted her to a "good buy" at the Houston Regional a couple of years ago.



Apparently this clock spotting skill was one Dan had learned from an uncle who was an NAWCC member. Dan's first clock, a Mauthe box clock, was purchased from this uncle while he was still in college. He shared stories about his uncle and their clock adventures as

well as some of the research he had done to learn more about this clock's maker.

Ken Reindel showed a Westclox alarm clock. This clock was the same model as the one he knocked off his dad's nightstand when he was six years old. Ken's mom helped him get the screws out of the case and then, incredibly, Ken was able to get the clock running despite a slight issue with the hairspring. And he hasn't stopped repairing and restoring clocks since then!

Gary Sertich brought a Seth Thomas Globe – a wonderful find, and from his perspective, it was purely beginner's luck. Although the movement had been subjected to oiling with some rather suspect substance, all the case needed was a little brass polish on the bezel. Living in Hershey, PA at the time, his journey to learn more about the Seth Thomas company and the style of clock led him to the NAWCC library, much as Tom's search had. In addition to the information he gleaned at the library, by speaking to people in the area where he bought the clock, Gary learned that he is the second owner of the clock, the first being a lumber yard in Lebanon, PA, where it had hung in the "office" area.



After the meeting, several attendees expressed how much they enjoyed seeing the items, learning more about a wide variety of topics, and hearing everyone's stories. Additionally, several members who were unable to attend have told us about what they had planned to bring and expressed their disappointment that they had conflicts. 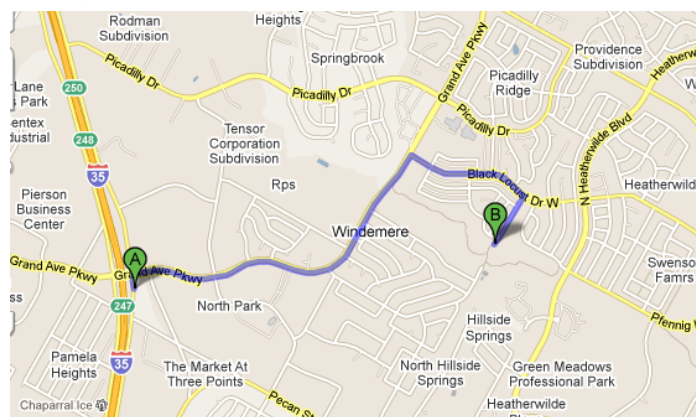
July Program – New Location

Field Suitcase Workshops Lathe Series

There are plans underway for the lathe series of Field Suitcase Workshops (F200, F201 and F202) to be held in Central Texas. These workshops begin with F200 – Fundamental Skills for Lathe & Clock Repair: Part I (metal working skills) to be offered Thursday – Sunday, December 1 – 4, 2011 in College Station. F201 (Fundamental Skills for Lathe & Clock Repair: Part II) will develop lathe skills using a hand graver and F202 (Lathe II Skills) will add to those skills through the use of a cross slide. F201 and F202 will follow F200 at approximately six month intervals.

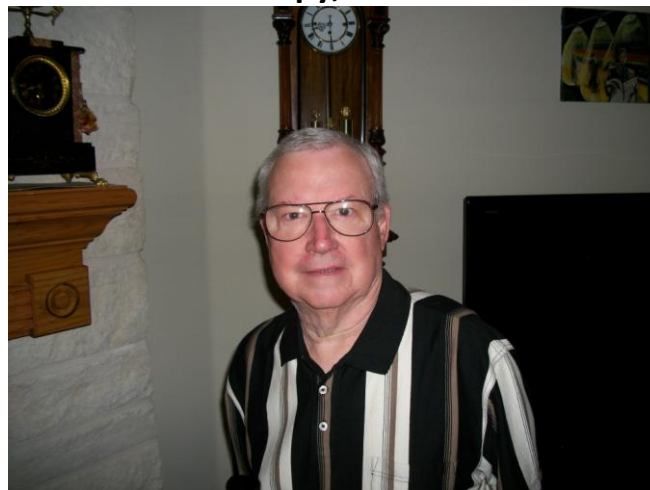

Annual meeting outstanding topics

During our annual meeting in May, there was preliminary discussion about several proposed changes to the by-laws: 1) an increase in dues for 2012 to help cover the costs of printing and mailing the newsletter, 2) the possibility of spouses serving concurrently *in certain roles* and 3) reducing the number of directors.
